# President's Letter – January 2010



Dear Friend of Lafayette:

I am pleased to report a number of items of interest to our membership.

(1) On October 18, 2009 at a meeting of the National Washington – Rochambeau

**Revolutionary Route Association in** Gloucester, Virginia, the Board of Directors considered a letter that I wrote to them that suggested "a Lafayette Connector" to their Congressionally approved Route, i.e., from Newport to Yorktown, tracking the march of General Rochambeau's and Washington's Armies in 1781. I will quote from the minutes of the meeting: "A letter to the Board from Alan R. **Hoffman** proposed that the W<sub>3</sub>R-MA develop a 'prequel trail' related to the W3R, through Massachusetts. The group approved W3R-MA going ahead with developing plans for this trail." What I had proposed was a trail from Boston to Morristown, New Jersey tracking **Lafayette**'s route when he returned to America in the spring of 1780 to tell Washington that French help was on the way. If any of you are interested in working on this project, please contact me.

(2) On Wednesday, January 27, 2010, at 6:00 p.m., I will be honored to talk about Lafayette at the New England Historic Genealogical Society in Boston. For those who have heard me lecture, please note that this is a new talk that I prepared last summer and was privileged to present to the French

Ambassador in Delaware on September 5, 2009. It is entitled: "Lafayette: Symbol of Franco-American Friendship" and has the additional advantage of being short – for me – not more than 40 minutes, including a new PowerPoint slideshow of Lafayette-related images. Hope to see you there.



#### Lafayette Factoid

Did you know that the first national park east of the Mississippi River was "Lafayette National Park"? President **Wilson** chose this name in 1919 for the Maine Park in honor of one of his heroes, General **Lafayette**. Unfortunately, **Lafayette**'s name was removed in 1929 when a donor offered to double the land of the Park if the name were changed. The donor was British with a long memory. Not long enough, perhaps, to know that the new name, Acadia National Park, brings to mind English "ethnic cleansing" of the French of Acadie – the Acadians – during and after the French and Indian War in the 1750's and 1760's.
